



Faulty large electrical appliances

Such as dishwashers, washing machines, fridges, dryers, stoves, televisions, computers, hi-fi devices



Faulty small electrical appliances

Such as mobile phones, electric razors, toasters, electric irons, hairdryers, portable radios, radio alarms, coffee machines



Bulky waste

Bulky household objects that are too large for the residual waste container are picked up four times a year (at no additional fee) from your doorstep, for example, wardrobes and kitchen cupboards, tables, shelves, chairs, empty clothes baskets, bedside tables, mattresses, bedsteads



Stop!

Before the objects are destroyed, ask yourself:

Is the furniture still in a good condition?

Well-preserved furniture can be united with grateful new owners via exchange or giveaway markets or as donations to charitable organisations.


Where to go with the waste?

Your guide to waste management in Bonn.

Paper and cardboard

For example, newspapers and magazines, catalogues, brochures, envelopes, notes, folding boxes, cartons (taken apart), egg cartons made from cardboard, **clean** paper bags



Emptying once a month
Bound together
(or paper depot containers)

Packaging


Such as yogurt, cream and quark tubs, milk and juice containers, fruit, vegetable, sausage and meat packaging, tins, silver paper, foils, tubes, plastic bags, screw caps, deep-freeze packaging



Emptying of containers and yellow bags once a month.
Large yellow containers twice a month

Organic waste

For example, fruit and vegetable peels, such as potato or banana peels, spoiled fruit and vegetables (raw), lettuce, tea leaves and coffee grounds, serviettes, paper towels, small amounts of grass and shrub cuttings, leaves, flowers



Emptying twice a month

Residual waste

Includes spoiled leftover food, dirt, vacuum cleaner bags, ash, cigarette butts, nappies, plasters, sanitary products, porcelain, bulbs, candle remains, cleaning sponges



Emptying usually approximately every 14 days;
containers weekly or several times per week

Glass

For example, non-returnable glass bottles and glasses such as wine bottles or marmalade and gherkin bottles



Sorted by colour into the glass containers



Harmful substances

For example, batteries, paints, lacquers, pesticides, household chemicals, fluorescent lamps, energy-saving bulbs, electrical devices



Retailers take back batteries at selling points

Into the blue bin

Into the yellow bin

Into the green bin

Into the grey bin
